

THE RUTHERSTON COLLECTION.

We urge all boys to take the first opportunity next term of examining the new set of pictures which will be sent in connection with the Rutherston Loan Scheme, and hung about the corridors.

From the comments one hears, it is plain that this term's collection has not been fully appreciated. This is probably because most boys judge the pictures by an unfavourable comparison with works in more orthodox styles. These pictures are all modern in style, and the artists have aimed at experimenting in new forms of expression.

"Flowers," by Gwen John, most not be looked at as an oil painting of a vase with a few flowers in it, but rather as a design in soft and exquisite colouring, for which the vase of flowers is but a motive or excuse. Indeed, it has been said that the painting is just as delightful seen upsidedown, and this may well be, for the true beauty of the work lies in the balancing and harmonising of one delicate colour with another. The picture becomes more lovely as one becomes more acquainted with it.

H. M. Carr's "Eastbourne" is a very modern kind of water colour. At first sight it appears a mere collection of

dirty blue and yellow smudges, but when one stands back and surveys it carefully, the meaning of the picture can be easily understood. Here the artist has shown great skill in surmounting the difficulty of portraying a scene of three dimensions on a surface possessing only two. An examination of some of the Mediaeval and Roman mural scenes in our history books will at once show how difficult it was found to overcome this look of flatness. In "Eastbourne" the artist secures the illusion of great distance by creating what is known as "atmosphere," making the scene recede into the distance as it does in reality.

A third illustration of the experiments in modern art is the drawing of "Horses" by Picasso. Here we have something quite different. There is no attempt by shading or recession to secure the idea of solidity. Picasso's whole efforts were devoted to producing lines of a beautiful rhythm, and this is what must be sought for. Anyone trying to find pictorial value in the maze of lines is doomed to failure.

A true appreciation of such pictures as these depends on learning what to look for in them, and on not judging them by standards which do not apply.

THE HARVESTERS.

In the early hours of the morning, during the month of August, parties of boys from the School cycled out of Southport, heading east. For five miles they enjoyed the clear country air, the fresh appearance of the fields still covered in dew, and the singing of the birds. Then they reached the farm to which they had been sent to work. Although it was not yet eight o'clock all the work of the farmyard had been completed, the cows milked and returned to their pastures, the byres and stables cleaned and the yard swept. Everything was ready for work in the fields.

After preliminary instructions had been given and each boy provided with an "apron"—a coarse sack tied by a piece of string—the boys, along with the permanent members of the farm staff, proceeded to the first field. During this operation we were employed gathering the loose cut stalks together, tying them into sheaves, and stacking the sheaves in an upright position in shocks. We found that it was not so easy as it looked to arrange six sheaves in such a way that they would stay upright, but practice made perfect. We obtained our reward in the evening when we viewed the field which, that morning, had been filled with waving corn and which now was empty save for the shocks scattered at intervals over the close-cut stubble.

A wet morning found us new employment, which was a welcome change from the back-breaking, monotonous work of stacking sheaves of oats. This work consisted of cleaning out the barn, stables and byres, and sweeping the walls clear of accumulated cobwebs. We were thankful to return to the fields again.
