

SCHOOL SURPORTED



About this time a year ago, we were all anxiously looking for news of Mr. Mason, fallen victim to serious illness, with the risks attendant on major operations. It brought us great joy to learn at last that he was out of danger and well on the way to recovery. It was felt then that this break would only accelerate a retirement already planned for the near future, and that we had really said good-bye to Mr. Mason as teacher; but when the Headmaster found himself hard pressed for helpers, those of us who had known Mr. Mason's stalwart character over many years could not be surprised to see him at his right hand again.

The resignation of a master who formed an original plank of the ship launched a quarter of a century ago may be held to mark an epoch. It was in outward seeming a school very different from the complex organism into which it has grown; but the seeds were sown in those earliest days, and the spirit quickened which has inspired its life. Almost throughout this span, Mr. Mason has filled the post of senior assistant to the Headmaster; and none will deny that for very much of what the School is and has been, and of what it has achieved, it is to Mr. Mason's unsparing toil and wise counsel that thanks are due. Never has any thought been nearer his heart than the best interest of the School as a whole, and of each of its members. And all without fuss or fret; all in complete equipoise; never angry except for righteousness' sake; devoid of the meannesses alas too human; emitting light without heat: so we think of him.

After long and devoted service here, and in other schools, a man might be forgiven the desire to "let up," become an elder statesman, a pavilion critic. Yet here he is in his old-time vigour, as befits one to whom schoolmastering has been not just a job, but an enjoyment. Until inured to greater leisure, Mr. Mason will, we are sure, miss those opportunities that teaching has offered: those openings for the helpfulness which has ever been in him so marked a trait. Pupil or colleague, none need ever hesitate to appeal to him; impossible to imagine a rebuff. Still, he will happily not be far to seek, and his spirit of service will always find new doors.

Mention of pavilions reminds us that, perhaps to the surprise of the newest generations, in days not long past Mr. Mason would venture considerably beyond a touch-line. We see a goal doggedly defended, and a "sphere"—no matter how strong its charge—ever attracted by one fist, and by it ever repelled; a fist that cared not a pin for the whole School XI.

And now this veteran, never lagging, surely not superfluous, takes his curtain; this man of parts, who has held our stage, speaks his last lines; and as he makes his bow, let him hear our hearty "Bravo!"

At the end of last term we said good-bye to three members of the staff, Mr. H. H. Hillman, Mr. W. H. Watts and Mr. J. R. Edwards.

Mr. Hillman had been on the staff since September, 1927, and had taught Mathematics, Physics and Biology. He will be remembered as a very stimulating teacher, with a keen sense of humour, and a very alert and able expounder of these subjects. He has taken up a post at Oxted County Grammar School, Surrey.

Mr. W. H. Watts joined the staff in September, 1941, at a critical period in the war, when he emerged from retirement in order to fill a vacancy on the Mathematics and Science staff. The boys learned to like him for his great patience and kindliness, and he was a veritable mine of information on many subjects. We appreciated very much the services he rendered at a time when he could have taken life in a far more leisurely fashion, and wish him a long and happy retirement.

Mr. J. R. Edwards, an Old Georgian, came to us at very short notice in November, 1944, to help in the teaching of Geography, Biology, Physics and Mathematics. 
Men's Union, Manchester University.

THE RUTHERSTON LOAN COLLECTION

There has been much interest again this term in the selection of pictures from the Rutherston Collection. It is a varied selection and its chief interest is that it gives the enthusiastic art student and the more conservative layman an opportunity of seeing something of the manner in which the artist works and the variety of approach which exists in his art.

For the most part, the works on view are studies and experiments in drawing and colour—that is, works done in the first place purely to satisfy the enquiring mind of the artist. They were not originally intended as exhibition pieces nor are they intended to be considered as great works of art. Nevertheless, they are works of art and they are interesting because of the singleness of purpose apparent in them,

and the success with which they each achieve their aim.

Studies—drawings, colour sketches, notes on design and lay-out often have a charm and interest all their own, rising from their spontaneity or from the manner of their execution or from the novelty of their approach. They are complete in themselves. Every great picture is inevitably the result of much preliminary work of this nature -experiment in drawing, design and colour-in which the problems involved in the finished work are solved and in which the form, colour and design of the finished work are decided, ensuring that nothing shall be included which does not contribute to the final complete expression. In the case of the great artist, there is always a certain satisfaction to be derived from the least of his sketches, as it represents an aspect of his individuality as a great artist and has a value in that it assists towards a better and deeper appreciation of his work. By studying "studies" and preliminary sketches in line, tone and colour, and applying sane critical judgment to the study, we increase our appreciation of all art and we are brought into closer personal touch with the artists' aims, in exactly the same way as if we were invited to their studios and shown, step by step, how pictures are created.

The sketch in wash by Augustus John, for example—the line drawing "A Woman Standing" by Wyndham Lewis, and Matisse's "Trees with Figures"—these are all studies, complete in themselves and interesting reflections or facets of the artist's personality and outlook.

In "Primulas" by Winifred Nicholson, the experimental approach is again evident. Its aim is to capture the colour of the group and its surroundings in bright sunlight. The details do not matter—drawing is reduced to a minimum; there is no careful searching for line and form—as in "The Woman Standing"—but the aim is clear and successfully achieved. It is not great art: it is purely a studio experiment which has the value of any and every experiment in that it adds to our knowledge; in this case, of the qualities of light and their expression or interpretation in terms of pigment.

THE GREEK THEATRE

On November 16th a lantern lecture on "The Greek Theatre" was given by Mr. Davison, of the Classical Association, to members of the upper forms. He began with a short and witty description of the main differences between the Greek drama and our own, and claimed that, to understand them thoroughly, a knowledge of the special circumstances of the ancient theatre was essential.

Then, with the aid of slides, he sketched the development of the Greek theatre from its origins to the days when four-day dramatic festivals were held regularly in the Athenian amphitheatre. Born of the early religious festivals in Athens, at which the priest was masked so that if he made a mistake in the ceremony he might escape the wrath of the gods, and the chorus sang odes in honour of Dionysus,

god of fruitfulness, this child of the Greek imagination grew lustily. The mask became the conventional head-dress of the actor and the odes resolved themselves into dramatic dialogues between the priest, who took the principal role, and the chorus. At length more than one part was taken by the chief actor, and later two more actors were introduced. The youthful offspring of Dionysus had become that full-grown giant, the Greek drama.

As the drama developed, so too grew up the theatre. From the humble circle formed by a few spectators was evolved the huge amphitheatre, of which examples can still be seen at Athens and Delphi. The Greeks must have had a wonderful knowledge of acoustics, for, as was shown by slides, actors' voices had to travel over immense distances, and yet were audible to the remotest listener. The last slide, a picture of an actual performance in a modern replica of the Greek theatre, conveyed very effectively the spirit of the ancient drama and the impression which it must have left on an Athenian audience.

In proposing a vote of thanks, Solomon suggested that in future such lectures might well be given at least twice a term, and the meeting closed with much appreciative applause for Mr. Davison. H.M.S.
